

Last Week's Meeting

It was a beautiful sunny day outside our compound. Inside last week's musical duet had morphed into a trio with Linda Burroughs on piano, Sam Bishop on harmonica and Michael Harrison playing guitar. Later we sang "America the Beautiful" accompanied by the band singing only slightly off key. My tablemates for the day, Richard Beach, Carol Lezin, John Huffman, Russ Hobbs, Jim Wisenstein and Cynthia Kiligan were discussing Cabrillo, the local real estate market, west and southern coast Florida vacations, downtown leasing updates and houseless issues, while I was doing my best to take notes on what was going on around the room. John Burroughs won the raffle prize donated by Eric Dybdahl and very smartly gave it to his wife, Linda, as an anniversary gift, but Linda may have had higher expectations. Only John would know. Donna updated our weekly progress on the 5/3/14 Roman Holiday Event which is moving along well. Larry Wolfsen auctioned Chas Eldridge's 4 excellent Sharks seats for a night. Jim Zenner left \$400 poorer or \$200 richer since each ticket had a face value of \$150.

Detective Dan Aldrich was in rare form. He proclaimed to be a man full of a sort of madness that only takes place in March and even though it is almost a religious experience for Dan, in many minds it does not replace Easter or Lent. His passion focused on the NCAA basketball tournament and his chance to win a billion dollars for the UC system from Warren Buffet if he could guess all the winning teams. His myopic UC view reduced the PAC 12 to the elite 1, by only

congratulating UCLA and not Stanford, Oregon, Utah, Colorado and Arizona. Dan stacked the deck like a Las Vegas Casino, with 3 part questions that only one table person could answer. Any wrong answer became fineable for the person and the table. Any help was subject to some outrageous fines. The casualties of his mayhem included Ms. Burroughs, Ms. Clifton, Dick Muir, Kevin Dempsey, Larry Wolfsen, Dan Seiftel, Jeannette Pagliaro, Michael Hewitt and Aleene Althouse. Earlier Dan fined the members of his Scholarship Committee as evidently he found out they were short on scholarship funds. Wes Walker and Martin Bernal contributed too, before we ended singing Happy Birthday to Dan Seiftel.

Our speaker, Teresa Launders, is the incoming SV Rotary President. She went through a power point presentation on our Rotary Guatemala Project that our club sponsored and Sharon Caiocca was the grant writer. What we already knew about Guatemala was it had 13 million people; of which 59% were of Europe-North American descent and 40.5% were indigenous. Guatemala City was twice as large as the next city with over a million residents. The average yearly income was \$5200 and the official language was Spanish, but 21 Mayan dialects were more commonly spoken. 75% of the population over the age of 15 was literate. 50% were Roman Catholic. The screen had lots of happy images of children's faces, red and blue shirted Rotarians, simple dress and one princess with her crown. The Uniendo Project Fair was a gathering place for ideas and networking. This year 24 Rotarians, 4 current/past Governors and 2 Optometrists were on the

February 2-5 trip. Highlights of the trip were visiting the nineteen widows who got stoves and witnessing how they were used during home visits. The wood stoves were more fuel efficient, and healthier then what they had before. The kit included a vent that went outside so smoke was not trapped inside their abode. The doctors completed an eyesight evaluation, before providing glasses that would change their lives. The Rotarians who went on the trip had a couple of "Rotary changes lives" incidents. During an exam one child could not see more then 8 inches from his face. He was given glasses and for the first time could see past his outstretched hands. Sadly during an eye exam the doctor could tell from looking at a man's eyes that he had brain cancer. This was preventable.

They had a Family Album Project where they took pictures of the children and passed them around so each kid got a picture of him or herself to take home. Later they handed out shoes and shirts as prizes. Jon Winston became a "verified shoe salesman." The biggest part of the trip was health education learning how to brush teeth, nutrition, washing hands, first aid, sanitation, and respiration and learning how to say, "ayudame" or help me. She finished by answering a few questions. One question was on solar cooking which would be possible but the cooks would have to be educated on how to use it. The other question was on water supply and quality. It was "poor and not drinkable" as she learned after drinking the local water for 3 days. She went to see a doctor who said, "since you have been drinking the water for 3 days you are okay, because if you were infected you should be sick by now."
