

March 8th Meeting:

Sharon Caiocca reported that plans are being made for a return visit to Guatamala where she led an international service project earlier this year. The projected date is January 14, 2014, the expected time commitment 10 days, and volunteers are invited. She also told us about a partnership under discussion with the Los Gatos morning club to deliver hospital equipment to Laos in April 2014.

The Raffle:

Grant Dow's raffle gift of an "Ocean Breeze" candle on a pewter plate was won by Wally Dale.

Detective Report:

Detective **Sam Bishop** led the "Rotary Chorus" in a program of old (verrry old!) favorites including *Oh, Susanna, Camptown Races* (do dah!), *On Top of Old Smoky, Darling Clementine*, and *Row, Row Your Boat* (Which sank with all hands on board). **Sam** provided harmonica and concertina accompaniment, and the fines were an old-fashioned "freewill" offering.

The Program:

Immediate Past President Janet Krassow brought the club up to date on the Santa Cruz Rotary Community Fund, which was founded In 2006 to meet a need identified by a member. It was Jim Bargetto, who suggested that Santa Cruz Rotary needed a separate entity to distribute support to community organizations and insure that member contributions would be eligible for income tax deductibility. The present name of the foundation was selected to avoid confusion with the Rotary's district and international funds.

In seven years the fund balance has grown to \$235,000 with a targeted corpus or principal amount of \$500,000. Until reaching that goal, Janet explained, half of contributions are allocated to the corpus and the remaining half to current distributions.

Our major fund-raising event last year, the Gilligan's Island dinner-dance, brought in some \$36,000, and the members were enthusiastic in fixing \$50,000 as the 2013-14 objective. We were reminded of the various ways which could generate that level of funding: attending, bringing guests, making sponsorship pledges to cover expenses, donating auction prizes, and bidding generously for the items. This year's theme is to be announced at today's meeting by president designate and event chair **Donna Maurillo.**

The remainder of the program consisted of brief presentations by five currently sponsored organizations beginning with Steve from Harbor High School, who described their Harbor Lights Project to raise \$125,000 in matching funds to light the athletic fields.

Ernie Camacho spoke on behalf of Pop Warner youth football, which has been operating in Santa Cruz County since 1967 and presently involves about 250 players. Their funds are being used for equipment, especially upgraded helmets, and for educating coaches on managing the risks of concussion, he said.

Ama Delevett, from the Survivor's Healing Center, told the audience about her organization's work with young victims of sexual abuse. Acting under the umbrella of the Family Services Agency, the center has nine groups undergoing counseling, seven of them girls and young women.

She said the youthful victims are often subject to post-traumatic stress (PTS) syndrome and at risk for alcohol or drug addiction as a result of such abuse, and told a story about Sigmund Freud, the Austrian psychiatrist. His published theories concerning sex theories were resented by the Gestapo, which insisted they inferred that they practiced

sexual abuse, and refused to allow Freud, a Jew, and they blocked his immigration to London with other prominent Jewish figures.

According to the story, Freud eventually revised his theories and was permitted to leave. Whether fact or gossip, the story was consistent with Freud's attitude toward the Nazis. When influential Austrians, more concerned with protecting *Herr Doktor's* health and intellect than his faith, got him his exit visa in 1938, Freud scribbled his famously sarcastic farewell on the document: "I can heartily recommend the Gestapo to anyone."

Cita Rasul, representing CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates), spoke about her organization, which assists some 200 of the approximately 600 minors caught up in the legal system in Santa Cruz County. A national organization, the various chapters walk with young people up to age 21 who become wards of the court when removed from their homes by child protective services or whose parents or care givers are in custody or otherwise not available.

The volunteers agree to spend two to four hours a week for two years with these atrisk children and youths. Male volunteers particularly needed, she said.

The final speaker was Mark Booze from the Girl Scouts. He explained that there are 112 councils nationwide, the Santa Cruz scouts belonging to one that reaches north to Scotts Valley from Ventura. He told the audience that there are about 600 adult volunteers in this council, which operates Camp Artemis in Boulder Creek, teaching leadership skills to 12 to 18-year-olds.

Girl Scouts are famous for their annual cookie sales, and we were told that every four-dollar box produces a dollar for the bakery, one for the national organization and two dollars for the council. Gluten-free cookies are on the menu for next year, Booze said, and calorie-counting customers can designate their boxes for members of our armed forces overseas as sweet reminders of home.
